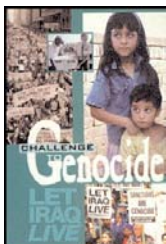

Challenge to Genocide: Let Iraq Live

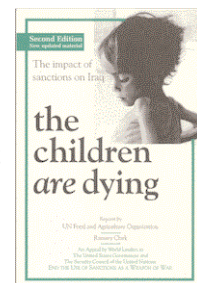
Contains essays and detailed reports on the devastating effect of the economic sanctions on Iraq since the beginning of the Gulf War. It features "Fire and Ice," a chapter by former U.S. Attorney General Ramsey Clark. Also included are personal memoirs from many who defied the sanctions and U.S. law by taking medicines to Baghdad as part of the May 1998 Iraq Sanction Challenge.

The Children Are Dying: The Impact of Sanctions on Iraq

This groundbreaking report of the UN Food and Agriculture Organization revealed to the world the devastating effects of the U.S./UN sanctions against Iraq. The book includes supporting documents and articles by Ramsey Clark, Ahmed Ben Bells, Tony Benn, Margarita Papandreou and other prominent international human rights figures.

A great tool for the emerging movement against sanctions. The Children are Dying includes facts and figures that prove the undeniable human tragedy imposed by sanctions, a new weapon of mass destruction. The UN FAO report shows that over 500,000 Iraqi children under the age of five have died as a result of U.S./UN-imposed sanctions. The accompanying photos and chapters define the social implications. Genocide by Sanctions: The case of Iraq

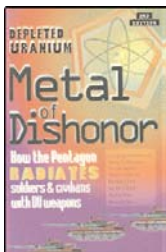
This powerful video comes out of Ramsey Clark's 1997 trip to Iraq to document the effects of the blockade on the people there, particularly the children. It contains important historical perspective that explains why the United States is so determined to maintain the sanctions.

This excellent video took second prize in the George Sidney Independent Film Competition. The third annual film competition is part of the San Luis Obispo International Film Festival. (video, 28 min., 1998, \$20)

Let Iraq Live

Portrays the incredible journey of the Iraq Sanctions Challenge - 84 people from the United States who risked 12-years imprisonment to take millions of dollars of medicine to the Iraqi people, includes Ramsey Clark, Bishop Thomas Gumbleton, and Rev. Lucius Walker in May 1998.

"Let Iraq Live" exposes the human toll of U.S./UN sanctions on Iraqi society. More than 1.5 million civilians, mostly children, have died from disease and malnutrition in the last eight years, according to UNICEF. The searing images of human suffering captured in this dramatic video will likely turn even the casual viewer into a political activist. (video, \$20)



Metal of Dishonor: Depleted Uranium: How the Pentagon Radiates Soldiers & Civilians with DU Weapons

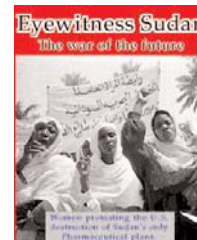
A devastating exposé of the Pentagon's new weapons comprised of Depleted Uranium. This is the book you've heard about, but won't see in most bookstores. Now in its second printing you can read scientists; Gulf War veterans; leaders of environmental, anti-nuclear, anti-military and community movements discuss: the connection of Depleted Uranium to Gulf War Syndrome and a new generation of radioactive conventional weapons.

Eyewitness Sudan: The War of the Future

A powerful video exposé of the August 1998 U.S. bombing of the El Shifa pharmaceutical plant, the small factory that provided more than half the medicine for Sudan. The smoking ruins and dashed hopes of Sudanese doctors are skillfully juxtaposed to footage of Clinton, Albright and Berger's charges of terrorism.

Follow former U.S. Attorney General Ramsey Clark and his team of investigators and activists as they expose this U.S. war crime against the people of the Sudan. This investigative documentary connects the years of sanctions and U.S. funding of a contra-type army to the cruise missiles sent against an impoverished African country. (video, \$20)
